
#### **Annual Appeal Report**



## State of New Jersey Index of Wills, Inventories, Etc.

Wills are an oft-neglected source of genealogical information. If one is lucky, they can contain the names of all of the living children of the deceased, as well as their spouses and sometimes grandchildren as well. This can be a great help for those earlier years and locales where records were sparse. If you're working on a lineage society application, here's your connection between generations!

If you're looking for wills in New Jersey, this three-volume index is a great place to start. It's organized by county, so you'll need to know that. But even if you don't, it doesn't take long to take a quick look county by county (New Jersey has a total of 21). Once you know the records exist you can then seek them out by county or on the state level, on *FamilySearch* or *Ancestry*.

Remember that many early residents of coastal Connecticut (specifically, Branford and Milford) relocated to Essex County, New Jersey.
